From the Office of the Interim Pastor: The Rev'd Dr Scott Dennis, PhD

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Last month, we reflected on our life's journey crossing over from our pilgrimages through Lent to our pilgrimage together through Eastertide. One of our favorite Easter stories concerns our Lord Jesus encountering two of His disciples on a walk, or a pilgrimage, on the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus. Perhaps, then, it is still helpful, if not also light-hearted, to restate what I remember my mom taught me to say as a little boy: April showers bring May flowers and Mayflowers bring Pilgrims. Since the May flowers will be in full bloom due to our April showers, then I guess with all these May flowers around us, that, along with the story from the road to Emmaus, what does it mean to be a pilgrim? Should we undertake our own pilgrimages? If so, then why do pilgrimages matter?

One of my friends and colleagues, Ben, undertook a pilgrimage several years before the Covid lockdown. He walked along the El Camino de Santiago way, which is a 500-mile footpath across northern Spain. As a Protestant Pastor immersing himself in Roman Catholic religious practice, he immediately noticed the prevalence of crucifixes along his footpath. He shared with me his experience several months after he returned, describing the start of his pilgrimage in Roncesvalles, Spain, where he spent some time alone in a 13th-century chapel gazing upon a medieval crucifix, where he pondered how he was going to spend his 500-mile pilgrimage walk.

Ben found his pilgrimage journey-by-foot to be spiritually transformative.

I remember he shared with some of his fellow Pastors how every crucifix looked similar, yet different. For him, this emphasized how the death of Jesus has been all too quickly domesticated, meaning that the crucifixion has gone from being a compelling story into some a sterile, stagnant, religious formula. That would be to sanitize the crucifixion – the cross made palatable for 'polite society' and devoid of all scandal or intrigue. Over the course of his presentation, Ben shared several insights that came to him as he contemplated all the different crucifixes he had seen over the course of his 500-mile journey on foot.

First, he was impressed by how scandalous the cross is. The crucifixion is ultimately the damning indictment of the world as it has been arranged by sinful man. When the Son of God entered our world, our systems of violent empire and sacrificial religion nailed Him to a tree to murder Him. This is the moment when the principalities and powers that run the world were put to shame and their claims of being 'wise' and 'just' were shown to be nothing but an empty sham, as the Apostle Paul writes (1 st Cor. 1:18).

Second, Ben was impressed by the cross as an image of unspeakable pain. After many days of walking, he himself began to suffer with blisters on his feet, as many pilgrims do. For him, his walking along in pain was a reminder that even as he walked with painful blisters, he tried to remember in prayer those who live with chronic pain — be it physical, emotional, mental, or spiritual pain. His second insight reminds us of the Scripture verse: By His wounds we are healed (1 Peter 2:24). Yet, Ben's insight further reveals yet another mystery about the Christian faith: when we bring our wounds to the wounded Jesus, that does not increase our woundedness, but rather that bringing of our wounds to the wounded One tends to bring us towards healing and wholeness.

Third, Ben became aware of the great beauty that is to be found in all the crucifixes as objective works of medieval and renaissance art. This may seem undignified since, on a purely objective level, there is nothing beautiful about the sight of man being tortured to death. Yet beauty is present in the crucifixion of Jesus, and artists throughout history have rendered us, and subsequent generations, a great service by calling our attention to it. We can say this because, shining through the grotesque ugliness of human torture and murder is the magnificent beauty of God's love and outrageous, generous forgiveness. Surely this is evident in Jesus' utterance from upon the cross, Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do (Luke 23:34). I remember my friend Ben came away from his long pilgrimage with his newfound conclusion that "Jesus' love is the beauty that saves the world."

Brothers and sisters, we don't need to travel to far-off places like Spain to have our own transformative pilgrimages this Easter season. All we really need to do is journey to our pews, to hear God's Word read, sung, and preached, and to feast on the visible proclamation of God's grace in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Perhaps you will mark your calendars and join us for this year's special Ascension Day service at 7 o'clock on Thursday, May 9th, at Forks-Zion. I hope you'll still join us for our regular worship services this Easter season that we all may be transformed, like my friend Ben, into having a deeper appreciation for the beauty of grace that is to be found in our Lord Jesus' sacrifice unto death for us and for our salvation.

Therefore, let us take up the challenge to pilgrimage! Let us journey boldly forth this Eastertide knowing that the God of resurrection and new life meets us wherever we are to be found along the path, where we are, as we are, blisters, pains, and all, and He even has the nerve to greet us as His friends! If our Lord Jesus greets us as His friends and He invites us to journey with Him into the great unknown future, how can we not but help be all the more transformed by His beauty which saves the world?

Happy Easter and let's celebrate our Lord's resurrection by keeping the home fires burning!

In March, the <u>unrestricted usable income</u> total was \$6,849.00. The balance of income was restricted for other uses. For example \$11,081.68 of the income was from Bethesda and Forks' Endowment to be used <u>ONLY</u> for Pastor's salary, benefits, and other required pastoral expenses. Expenses paid from unrestricted funds totaled \$7,656.12. This amount includes utilities, staff salaries & wage taxes, church supplies, social event expenses, etc.

The actual balance in General Funds available to pay utilities, staff salaries and other common/budgeted expenses as of April 26 is \$3,333.26. On Sunday, April 28, staff salaries and other bills totaling \$2,425.88 will be paid and offering will be received. End of April actual numbers will be provided in the next newsletter.


